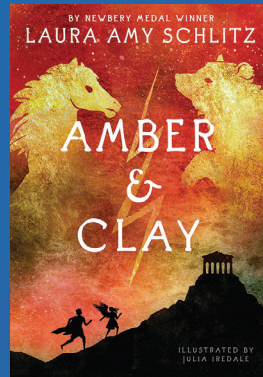
AMARI AND THE NIGHT BROTHERS

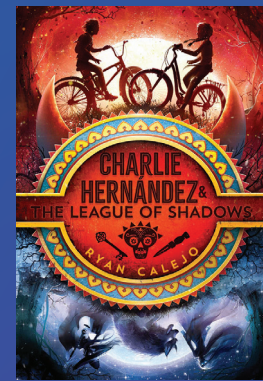
Spotlight on Readers' Advisory

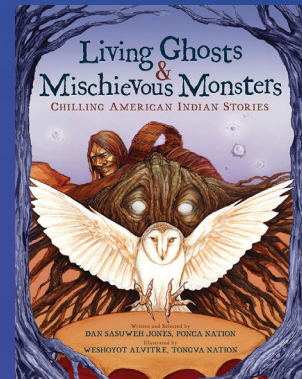

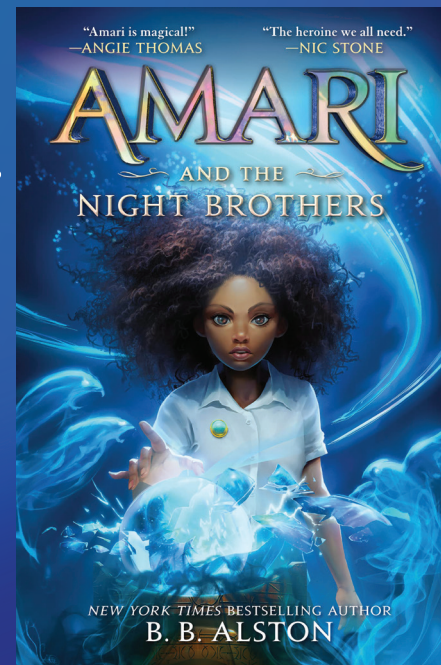

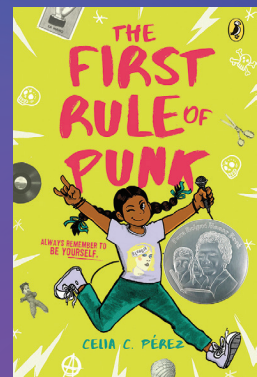

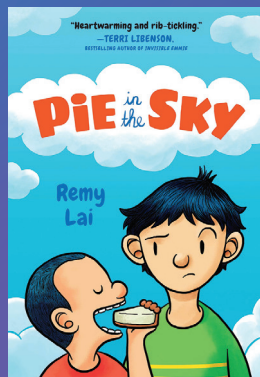
